A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Public School Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund of Chicago was held Thursday, November 15, 1979.

The President, Mr. Wilkie, called the meeting to order at 3:30 P.M.

OATH OF OFFICE

In accordance with the requirements of Section 17-138 of the Illinois Pension Code, Mr. Albert Korach and Miss Margaret A. Olson, elected by the contributors and Dr. Herbert E. Johnson and Mrs. William L. Rohter, appointed by the Board of Education, subscribed to the following constitutional oath of office:

"I do solemnly swear that I will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Illinois, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of the office of trustee of the Public School Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund of Chicago according to the best of my ability,"

The oath of office was filed with the documents for this meeting.

COMMUNICATIONS

The Certifications of Candidates and Declaration of Election

The Recording Secretary presented the following communication from the Canvassing Board, the official body charged with examining petitions and counting ballots in trustee elections.

The Canvassing Board reports the expiration of the terms of Albert Korach and Margaret A. Olson, trustees of the Public School Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund of Chicago. On October 1, 1979, petitions for candidates for trustees of the Fund were examined in accordance with the provisions of Article 8, Section 9 of the Rules of the Board of Trustees. Each petition was signed by no less than two hundred contributors, was filed before the deadline on September 21, 1979, for the election on October 26, 1979, and was executed for no more than one candidate.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PENSION LAW AND RULES

1980 Legislative Proposals

The Committee on Pension Law and Rules recommended possible changes in the Pension Code for introduction in the Illinois General Assembly. The following program was presented for consideration by the entire Board of Trustees, with the understanding that appropriation bills will again take first priority in the Fund's proposals.

- Proposal 1 Revise the automatic annual increase from 3% to 4% per year.
- Proposal 2 Change early retirement without discount provision (Senate Bill 375) so that employer contributions are mandatory rather than optional.
- Proposal 3 Start automatic annual increase at age 56 instead of 61 years of age.
- Proposal 4 Grant a one-time increase to each service and disability pensioner with 20 or more years of service and total monthly pension of less than \$334.00 on December 1, 1980. The increase shall be the smaller of (1) \$60.00 or (2) 334.00 minus the total monthly annuity of December 1, 1980. The increase will start with the January 1, 1981 pension warrant. (To be funded by separate appropriation.)
- Proposal 5 Grant military service credit (up to two years) served before the pension period.
- Proposal 6 Allow remarriage of a surviving spouse with no loss of survivor's pension at age 55.
- Proposal 7 Allow 3% automatic annual increase to survivors.
- Proposal 8 Regular housekeeping bill to remove obsolete materials and make corrective or clarifying changes that do not change the meaning and intent of present law.

The committee recommended that these proposals be approved and that the Executive Director be authorized to proceed with the drafting of the necessary legislative bills and take the appropriate steps to effect their introduction and passage by the General Assembly.

Dear Members of the Board:

The attached bond exchanges were completed for the Chicago Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund during September and October. Bonds having a face value of \$14,329,000 were sold for \$11,367,532 and replaced with bonds having a face value of \$14,350,000 at a cost of \$11,283,655. As a result, you increased face value \$21,000 and annual income \$3,401 while receiving \$83,877.

Summarizing all exchanges under this program since inception in December of 1969, we have increased face value \$431,552. Most important, we have increased annual income by \$1,265,358. In the process of completing these improvements, \$1,107,886 net has been paid to the Chicago Teachers' Pension Fund.

Possibility the most interesting feature this period was that seven of the nineteen trades resulted in improved quality. This is definitely the direction to be going, particularly when we never give up more than 10 basis points on any trade. Four of the trades were complete round trip reversals, so the upgrading process was even more pronounced than it appears.

Seven of the trades were reversals, continuing our pattern of nailing down profits. The U.S. Steel, AT&T trade discussed in my last letter continues to be executed this time. The several Mobil Oil 7-3/8 trades were also gratifying in that we locked up a nice profit of \$6,850 by going both ways in less than a week.

The outstanding trade in this period was the Gas Service to Vermont Yankee move. On September 19th we went to the Vermont Yankee 9-5/8 of 98 taking out \$26.89 per \$1,000 bond. On July 9, 1975 we went the other way taking out \$8.27 while picking up 50 basis points. The net gain on \$500,000 bonds is \$17,580 plus about \$8,000 in additional income during the four years.

Investment Counseling Service

The Committee on Investments reported that it is the trustees' practice to review the Fund's relationship with Capital Supervisors, Investment counsel, at the November meeting.

Capital Supervisors proposes to continue to assist the Fund in managing its investments. Their primary responsibility is to recommend appropriate investment action on existing and growing fixed income and equity holdings. Included in these activities is the responsibility for advising the Board of new developments and techniques in the investment area that could pertain to the Fund's portfolio.

Capital Supervisors has recommended maintaining their fee at the present rate of 1/50 of 1% applied to assets under their management, proposing on the advice of the Executive Director, a ceiling. At present the quarterly maximum is \$32,500. Capital Supervisors offers a maximum quarterly rate of \$35,000 for the coming year.

The committee recommended that Capital Supervisors be retained as the Fund's investment counsel under the schedule mentioned above, effective January 1, 1980.

On motion by Mr. Hunter, seconded by Mr. Knox, and by the following rollcall vote, the recommendation of the committee was approved and the retention of Capital Supervisors as investment counsel was authorized in accordance with the conditions described above, effective January 1, 1980.

REPORT OF FINANCIAL SECRETARY

Tax Levy for Fiscal Year 1979-1980

The Financial Secretary presented report number 79-169-2 of the Chicago Board of Education certifying the amounts and purposes for which a school tax is required for the fiscal year 1979-1980. Included is the sum of \$32,193,761.00 for the purpose of providing revenue for the Public School Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund. At its regular meeting on October 17, 1979, the Board of Education ordered that a formal demand and direction be made upon the City Council of the City of Chicago to levy the aforesaid tax and also that the President and Secretary of the Board of Education be authorized and directed to present and file a certified copy of the resolution with the City Council of the City of Chicago.

It was recommended that this report be accepted and that a copy of the Board of Education's resolution be filed with the documents of this meeting.

House Bill No. 2569, the Personal Property Tax Replacement Tax Act, which became effective July 1, 1979 provides that "(U)nder no circumstances shall any taxing district during each of the first two years of distribution of the taxes imposed by this amendatory Act of 1979 be entitled to an annual allocation which is less than the funds such taxing district collected from the 1978 personal property tax." The Chicago Board of Education Budget for fiscal year 1979-1980 budgets \$11,781,849.00 as the Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund's share of the personal property replacement tax."

*The validity of the Personal Property Tax Replacement Tax Act is presently being challenged in Continental Illinols National Bank & Trust Company of Chicago, et al. v. Zagel (No. 52339 Ill. Sup. Ct.), and Coran, Inc. v.Zagel (No. CH 6013 Cir. Ct. of Cook County), but no final decision has been made in those cases.

On motion by Mr. Knox, seconded by Miss Olson, the report of the Financial Secretary regarding the tax levy fer the fiscal year 1979-1980 was accepted, and the resolution on this behalf was ordered filed with the documents of the meeting.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Decision on Ralph C. Yochim Case

The President called for a decision in the matter of a hearing regarding Ralph C. Yochim conducted by the full Board of Trustees on June 21st and September 20, 1979. After some deliberation, the trustees unanimously voted to deny the petition of Mrs. Ralph C. Yochim. The attorney was instructed to prepare a summary of the Board's findings with copies to be sent to all board members and parties to the hearing and also to be retained in the Pension Office files.

Organization of the Board

held in November for the purpose of organizing the Board for the ensuing year.

We cannot be in the position of advising either party against the other.

Dear Board Members:

The attached bond exchanges were completed for the Chicago Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund during November, December and January. Bonds having a face value of \$19,200,000 were sold for \$14,420,036 and replaced with bonds having the same face value at a cost of \$14,786,892. As a result, you increased annual income \$22,774 while paying \$366,856.

Summarizing all exchanges under this program since inception in December of 1969, we have increased face value \$431,552. Most important, we have increased annual income by \$1,288,132. In the process of completing these improvements, \$741,030 net has been paid to Chicago Teachers' Pension Fund.

This program continues to move ahead about as expected. During the latest period we were able to improve both quality and yield. About 30% of the trades were reversals continuing this pattern. The U.S. Steel to AT&T trade discussed earlier continues to work. In October we went from steel to telephone picking up 27 basis points. Two months later we went the other way gaining an additional 10 basis points on 1½ million bonds for a net gain of \$33,375.

Another outstanding trade was the GMAC 4% of 86 to GMAC 7% of 92. September 8, 1978 we shortened giving up 7 basis points and taking out \$49,170 on 500,000 bonds. January 24th we returned to our original position picking up 35 basis points and paying up \$3,175. During the sixteen months we gave up about \$16,000 in interest for a net gain of about \$30,000.

during the fiscal year ending August 31, 1979 and discussed the procedures in conducting the audit of the respective accounts. Comparison was also made of the assets and liabilities of the previous report for fiscal 1978.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PENSION LAW AND RULES

Housekeeping Bill

Mr. Korach, Chairman of the Committee on Pension Law & Rules reported that the committee had met to consider items for inclusion in the Fund's 1980 housekeeping bill. The trustees accepted the following suggested changes to Article 17 of the Illinois Pension Code as their 1980 housekeeping bill.

- To change automatic annual increase and post-retirement increase reserve provisions so that these reserves show the same information as the Fund's other contribution reserves.
- Change from 4 months to a 2 month waiting period for refund of contributions. Delete section allowing waiver of waiting period by trustees.
- Insert clarifying language and deadlines for receipt of salary deductions from the Chicago Board of Education.

By the following roll-call vote the recommendations of the committee were approved and the Executive Director was authorized to take the steps necessary to effect introduction and passage of the housekeeping bill in the 1980 General Assembly.

REPORT OF THE ATTORNEYS

The trustees were further advised that legal developments over the next 30 days may result in a recommendation for legal action from the Fund's special counsel. The Board of Trustees took no formal action on special counsel's report and instructed Mr. Kelly to further research the matter of corporate personal property replacement tax revenues due the Fund.

Mr. John E. Angle of Kirkland & Ellis reported to the trustees his updated research on the questions of indemnification and/or insurance for errors and omissions by fiduciaries in the State of Illinois. The trustees requested further research be conducted by Kirkland & Ellis and the Pension Office staff as to current practices of other public funds in the State of Illinois and elsewhere.

The reports of the attorneys were accepted with appreciation.

A special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Public School Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund of Chicago was held Tuesday, April 1, 1980.

The President, Mr. Wilkie, called the meeting to order at 3:30 P.M.

ROLL CALL

Members present: Ms. Cheris, Mrs. Hunter, Mr. Knox, Mr. Korach, Mr. Wilkie, Miss Olson-6.

Members absent: Dr. Epps, Mrs. Rohter, Dr. Johnson (due to other obligations).

Others in attendance: Mr. Peter Kelly of McDermott, Will & Emery.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

On motion by Mr. Knox, seconded by Miss Olson, the minutes of the regular meeting of February 21 and special meeting of March 17, 1980 were approved and ordered printed.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

The president reported that the trustees' 1980 legislative proposals to the Illinois General Assembly had been introduced before the March 28th deadline.

The following bill numbers and sponsors were recorded in the Pension Office files.

House Bill 3064 —Tuerk—Appropriates \$62,036,600 for the Chicago Teachers' Pension Fund.

House Bill 3030 —Wolf—Appropriates \$750,000 for the Retired Teachers' Supplementary Payment.

House Bill 1876 —Birchler—Revise the automatic annual increase from 3% to 4% per year.

House Bill 3203 —McAuliffe—Change early retirement without discount provision so that employer contributions are mandatory rather than optional.

House Bill 3202/3233—White—Mautino—Start automatic annual increase at age 56 instead of 61 years of age.

House Bill 3155

—Kornowicz—Grant a one time increase to each service and disability pensioner with 20 or more years of service and total monthly pension of less than \$334.00 on December 1, 1980.

House Bill 3235 —Pouncey—Grant military service credit (up to 2 years) served before the pension period, subject to statutory cost requirements.

Senate Bill 1854 —Egan—Allow remarriage of a surviving spouse with no loss of survivor's pension after age 55.

House Bill 3164 — Taylor—Allow 3% automatic annual increase to survivors.

Senate Bill 1855 —Egan—Change the waiting period from 4 months to 2 months for refund of contributions. Requires salary deductions to be paid within 5 days. Deletes references to expenses to be charged to the special annual increase reserve funds.

COMMUNICATIONS

Report of Special Legal Counsel

Mr. Peter Kelly of the trustees' special counsel, McDermott, Will & Emery, reported to the trustees in the matter of corporate personal property replacement taxes. Special counsel recommended legal action to be initiated in order to clarify payment procedures under the new replacement tax law. An additional recommendation was that a litigation committee be formed to administer litigation brought by or on behalf of the Board of

Trustees. A general discussion ensued considering such topics as legal expenses, timeliness or possible delays in actions brought in Illinois courts and other general questions.

Mr. Kelly went on later in the meeting to report on another matter, the progress of research into any claims that might be available based on delayed withholding of employee contributions with resulting losses of interest revenue to the Fund. This research is thus far incomplete and the recommendation was made that the research be completed with a report to be made to a litigation committee at the trustees' next meeting.

On motion by Mr. Knox, seconded by Mrs. Hunter, the trustees authorized special counsel to file legal action outlined below against the Board of Education in the event satisfactory response is not received by counsel from the Board of Education by 10:00 A.M., April 3, 1980. The trustees further stipulated that a satisfactory response is to consist of (1) a voluntary settlement proposal from the Board of Education which would immediately place the Teachers' Fund in the same position it would now be in if the January replacement tax payments had been made in a timely fashion and (2) a firm commitment from the Board of Education, satisfactory to counsel, to adhere to its payment obligations with respect to future replacement tax revenues.

Ayes: Ms. Cheris, Mrs. Hunter, Mr. Knox, Mr. Korach, Mr. Wilkie, Miss Olson—6.

On motion by Mr. Korach, seconded by Ms. Cheris, the following resolution was adopted.

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the Public School Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund of Chicago (the "Fund") is responsible for the administration and the fiscal maintenance of the Fund; and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the Fund has approved the commencement of litigation against the Board of Education of the City of Chicago for certain amounts due the Fund and now considers it necessary and desirable to appoint a committee to administer such litigation;

Be it resolved that the trustees of the Fund who were present at the April 1st meeting and the Executive Director of the Fund be and are hereby appointed to serve as a litigation committee and such committee be and is hereby authorized and directed to administer any litigation brought by or on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the Fund against the Board of Education of the City of Chicago for amounts due to the Fund.

Ayes: Ms. Cheris, Mrs. Hunter, Mr. Knox, Mr. Korach, Mr. Wilkie, Miss Olson—6.

REPORT ON INVESTMENTS

Mr. A. Lee Thurow, of the trustees' investment advisory firm, Capital Supervisors, Inc., reported to the trustees on current investments in the Fund's portfolio. He indicated where Capital Supervisors' investment posture was changing in response to current economic factors. The essence of these changes was a move away from a substantially cautionary position to

one of moderately increased commitments to new and existing positions in the equity segment of the investment account.

After a question and answer period and some discussion the trustees accepted investment counsel's report with appreciation.

(The special meeting recessed at this point—5:45 P.M. for a meeting of the litigation committee. At 6:00 P.M. the trustees resumed their special meeting.)

Dear Board Members:

The attached bond exchanges were completed for the Chicago Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund between February 1 and May 15, 1980. Bonds having a face value of \$24,250,000 were sold for \$16,666,821 and were replaced with bonds having the same face value at a cost of \$16,566,108. As a result, you increased annual income \$67,423 while receiving \$100,713.

Summarizing all exchanges under this program since our inception in December of 1969, we have increased face value \$431,552. Most important, we have increased annual income by \$1,355,555. In the process of completing these improvements, \$841,743 net has been paid to Chicago Teachers' Pension Fund.

We are particularly pleased that we could improve overall quality during the latest period as well as increasing yield. You may note that in several instances we have completed similar trades such as the two Chicago Union Station to General Motors Acceptance Corp. The repetition results from the buyers specific needs and tendency to go back to successful trades.

Reversals are not necessarily our best trades but they do clearly demonstrate the benefits of this program. Since we have new board members let me again give the details of a recent reversal to demonstrate the benefits of this program. On February 26, 1980 we sold the Sears Roebuck 7-7/8 of 2007 going to Dow Chemical 7-7/8 of 2007. At that time we picked up 30 basis points and received \$45,000. On April 29, 1980 we went the other way giving up 7 basis points and paying out \$14,910 to go back into the Sears 7-7/8 of 2007. The net effect of the round trip was \$30,090 for your fund in two months.

Section 34-60 of the School Code and 17-128 of the Pension Code requires the Board of Education to demand and direct the City Council to levy a tax for the fiscal and school year 1980/81 in an amount equal to the amount of member contributions during the fiscal and school year 1978/79. This tax is known as the Public School Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund Tax, a portion of which is now subrogated by the Personal Property Replacement Tax Act which grants replacement of taxes lost through the repeal of the personal property portion of the Public School Teachers' Pension and Retirement Tax.

In addition, Section 17-128 of the Illinois Pension Code provides that in the case of teachers who are paid from special trust or federal funds, the Board of Education shall pay the full accruing pension costs to the Fund for current service from such trust or federal funds, The rate of contribution for this purpose is 12.2%.

The Financial Secetary recommends that a letter to this effect be sent to Dr. Smith.

On motion by Miss Olson, seconded by Mrs. Jantho, the recommendation of the Financial Secretary was approved and a letter to Dr. Smith regarding the tax levy for the fiscal and school year 1981 was authorized by unanimous vote.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Change from Daily to Weekly Recapitulation of Fund Receipts to Trustees

The Trustees considered the question of payments into the Fund, timely notification to Board members, and their resolution of December 13, 1979.

Under the resolution in effect the Trustees are to be notified immediately of any delay in payments into the Fund. Between December 13th and the present date, this system has been found to be unnecessarily cumbersome and prolific of unnecessary paper and mailing. The Trustees therefore rescind the resolution of December 13 regarding Delayed Payment of Employee Pension Deductions and herewith instruct the Executive Director of the Fund to continue notification on a weekly recapitulation basis.

On motion by Mr. Knox, seconded by Miss Olson, and by the following roll-call vote, the change from daily to weekly recapitulation of Fund receipts to Trustees was approved.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

The Trustees recessed their regular meeting at this point and met in Executive Session to consider litigation and personnel matters. The regular meeting was reconvened after approximately 20 minutes time.

REPORT OF THE ATTORNEYS

Mr. Jon Ocker of the Fund's general counsel, Kirkland & Ellis, and Mr. Peter Kelly of the Fund's special counsel, McDermott, Will & Emery, reported to the trustees on the question of indemnification for possible errors and omission liability. Each attorney submitted possible wording of by-law amendments or resolutions.

After considerable discussion and debate and pursuant to the provisions of the Illinois Revised Statutes, Chapter 108 1/2, S1-107, the following resolution was adopted later in the meeting.

The Fund agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless persons acting in the capacities of Trustees, employees, and staff members from any and all liability or allegations of liability, claims, suits, judgments and costs arising out of any acts or omissions, or any alleged acts or omissions, of the Trustees, employees or staff members committed or omitted in good faith in the performance of any duties in connection with the Fund. The trustees and the staff of the Fund shall be indemnified and protected by the Fund against all damage claims and suits, including defense thereof, when damages are sought for negligent or wrongful acts alleged to have been committed in the scope of the employment or under the direction of the trustees. This indemnification shall continue as to a person who has ceased to be a trustee, employee, or staff member, and shall inure to the benefit of their heirs, executors, administrators and estates (the "Indemnitees").

The Fund agrees to provide the Indemnitees with a suitable defense against any such liabilities, claims, suits, or judgments. The indemnification to which the Indemnitees shall be entitled will include all expenses incurred in their defense, Indemnification shall be made to the Indemnitee within thirty days after written request to the Fund, and shall not be deemed exclusive of any other rights to which those indemnified may be entitled under any agreement or vote of disinterested trustees or otherwise.

On motion by Mr. Knox, seconded by Ms. Cheris, and by the following roll-call vote, the resolution was adopted and ordered printed in the proceedings.
